STEPHANIE BARCLAY, SPEAKER

Professor Stephanie Barclay's research focuses on the role our different democratic institutions play in protecting minority rights, particularly at the intersection of free speech and religious exercise. Barclay's academic writing has been published or is forthcoming in publications such as the Harvard Law Review, the Washington University Law Review, the Notre Dame Law Review, and the Boston College Law Review. Her recent article, "An Economic Approach to Religious Exemptions," was selected for the 2020 Stanford/Harvard/Yale Junior Faculty Forum. Barclay directs Notre Dame Law School's Religious Liberty Initiative. She is a Nootbaar Fellow at the Nootbaar Institute on Law, Religion, and Ethics at Pepperdine University, and a Faculty Affiliate at the Constitutional Law Center at Stanford Law School. She has previously clerked on the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals and on the U.S. Supreme Court.
